

# WHOSE TURN TO STAND UP?

Three plants – GM in Wentzville, MO; Ford in Wayne, MI; and Stellantis in Toledo, OH – have been on strike since midnight September 14. On Friday, September 22, at 10am ET, UAW President Shawn Fain will give an update on Facebook Live. President Fain has let UAW members know that more plants will walk out at noon that day if there is not sufficient progress in negotiations. BE READY TO STAND UP!

The companies have begun laying off workers who are not on strike. If this affects you, you may or may not be eligible for unemployment compensation depending on the laws in your state. If you are not eligible for unemployment benefits, you will be considered "locked out" and will be paid strike pay and have your health insurance covered by the UAW. President Fain stated September 16, "The UAW will make sure any worker laid off in the Big Three's latest attack will not go without an income."

# GET YOUR WHOLE TEAM WEARING RED

Looking for a way to Stand Up on the job? You can build Red Shirt Wednesday in team:

- 1. Set a time and place to meet for a picture on Wednesday (outside break areas are great, and break times tend to work well).
- 2. Talk to your team a few days in advance about wearing red on Wednesday. Tell them the time and place to meet for the picture.
- 3. Follow up with your team before the end of the shift on Tuesday: "We're all wearing red tomorrow, right?"
- 4. On Wednesday don't forget to take a picture of your team wearing red and upload it to your local Facebook group. It'll help Red Shirt Wednesday grow!

## REFUSE VOLUNTARY OVERTIME

Across the Big Three, members not yet on strike are answering the UAW's call to refuse voluntary overtime. In a few plants, including Ford Buffalo Stamping and GM Arlington Assembly, members forced their plants to shut down entire shifts.

Local 276 member Tiffany Martin reports that throughout the week "everyone in our area stood firm on no breaks, no lunch overtime. The group leader came around just before lunch and asked everyone again to work lunch and even had a signup sheet for extended hours for tonight's shift. Everyone signed the paper with a big fat no."

In Local 160, Jessica Kelly got her entire shop to refuse Saturday and Sunday. When the company threatened to outsource their jobs to a non-union shop, she reminded others, "This is a fear tactic. It's the same as going down to a Local 12 picket line in Toledo and telling our brothers and sisters they should go back to the plant or else they will send their jobs to Mexico. We are all risking something, but it only works if we all risk it, because they can't retaliate against all of us."

Under the law, and confirmed by IUAW Legal Counsel, organizing to refuse voluntary OT is protected activity. If the OT mandatory then we don't have the same right to refuse, but we can always find other ways to show support and turn up the heat.
