

Attendee Information

Getting There

The convention will be held at the Westin Southfield, located at 1500 Town Center in Southfield, MI.

Transportation from Detroit Airport (DTW)

A taxi or rideshare service like Uber or Lyft will be the fastest way to get to Convention. Expect to pay about \$40 for a car from the airport. Looking for someone to split the fare? Send us an email at uawdemocracy@gmail.com.

McNamara Terminal

Taxi: Follow signs to Ground Transportation Center, located on Level 4.

Rideshare: Once across the Skybridge, continue to the bank of elevators located on Level 6 of the Ground Transportation Center. Take the elevator down to Level 4 to locate the Rideshare staging area.

Evans Terminal

Taxi: Follow signs to Ground Transportation Center, located on Level 4.

Rideshare: Once across the Skybridge, continue through the sliding glass doors. Take the elevator or escalator on the right, down to Level 1 to locate the Rideshare staging area.

Parking

There are limited spaces in front of the hotel and more available in the parking complex right behind the hotel. Both are \$10 overnight and free of charge for day use.



Voting in Steering Committee Elections

Elections for the UAWD Steering Committee will be held during the Annual National Meeting from 3:30 - 5:30 pm on Saturday. To vote, you must join UAWD in advance (by 2:30 pm) and be present in-person in the Algonquin Ballroom or on Zoom at <u>uawd.org/annual-meeting</u>.

When ballots are issued, you will receive an email from "OpaVote Voting Link" at the address "noreply@opavote.com". Access your ballot by clicking the "Vote" button. If you do not receive an email, check in with the Election Volunteers present in the ballroom and on the Zoom. We will ensure your primary email ballot is disabled. If you are in-person, you will be able to vote kiosk-style at a laptop. If you are on Zoom, you will be able to provide us with a secondary email.

The second part of the Annual National Meeting, to take up member-submitted bylaws amendments and resolutions, will take place on Zoom on Sunday, October 13. All members will receive the link to attend via email.
